

People's State Convention.

Terrible Burning Fluid Accident.

On Wednesday evening last a terrible accident from burning fluid occurred in Reading, by which the wife of Mr. John S. Bieckley, well known to many citizens of Allentown, was so severely burned that she has since died. The Reading Gazette gives the particulars as follows: Mrs. Bieckley, and her two daughters, 8 and 10 years of age, were sitting at a table, sewing, by the light of a fluid lamp, when the lamp suddenly exploded, scattering fire in all directions. Mrs. B had presence of mind enough to throw the burning fragments towards a door leading into the yard, but some of the fire fell upon her dress, and she was almost instantly enveloped in flames. Warning her children not to approach her, she endeavored to stifle the fire about her person with a piece of carpet, but finding it impossible, she ran into the yard, where her cries attracted the attention of Mr. Miller, and other neighbors, who hastened to her assistance. A portion of her clothing was entirely consumed, and she was horribly burned almost over her entire body, before the flames were extinguished. The furniture of the room also took fire, but it was put out before doing any damage. Mrs. Bieckley lingered in great agony until Thursday evening, when death put an end to her sufferings. This fearful accident was not the result of carelessness, but proceeded from causes to which all who use fluid lamps are exposed. An examination of the lamp, which was a medium sized Britannia one, proved that it had been eaten through by the action of the fluid upon the metal, causing the explosion. It is hoped that this terrible example of the danger of the various preparations of turpentine which go under the name of "burning fluid," will have the effect of banishing it entirely from household use. As a general thing there is no more safety in the lamps which hold it than in so many open powder flasks.

Proposed Change in the Law for the Collection of Wages.

Mr. Thompson, of Butler county, a member of the judiciary committee, has reported to the House of Representatives a bill of some interest to the public generally. It provides that in all assignments of property, whether real or personal, which may hereafter be made by any person or persons, firm, company, or association whether chartered or not, to trustees or assignees, on account of inability or pretended inability at the time of such assignment to pay his, her, their or its debts, the wages and salaries of persons, employed by such persons, firm, company, or association, shall be preferred and paid by such assignees or trustees, before any other creditors of such assignor or assignees. In cases of death, the act makes wages the first lien on the estate of the decedent and in all cases of executions, land bonds, warrants, &c., the amount is to be first paid out of the proceeds of the sale.—Wages are also made a lien upon real estate, and when the amount reaches twenty-five dollars, the creditor is empowered to proceed to collect the same by distraining therefor in the same manner as is provided now by law for the collection of rent.

Pike's Peak Gold Region.

There is no doubt that a large portion of the glowing and seductive accounts of the glittering attractions at Pike's Peak, are put in circulation by parties interested in inducing immigration in that direction. Now and then there comes a counterstatement which represents quite a different condition of affairs. In the last Kansas City Journal of Commerce there is published a letter from the late mayor of Nebraska City, in which the Pike's Peak gold mines are emphatically denounced as a humbug, and the friends of the writer are earnestly advised to stay away from them. He says that his company "have found the best quality of gold yet discovered, and cannot make one dollar per day." The letter (which is a private one) concludes as follows: "We were quite surprised a few days since when we read the gold accounts in the Missouri river papers, of what the miners are doing out here. I pronounce them a pack of lies, written and reported back by a set of pious one horse town speculators, and are calculated to ruin many a poor devil besides your humble servant. That there may be gold discovered to pay, I will not deny—hope it will. I am here, and may as well stay until satisfied. Should anything turn up, I will inform you."
