Cheese is plenty. gives the particulars as follows: Mrs. Bickley, and her two daughters, 8 and 10 years of age, were sitting at a table, sewing, by the light of a fluid lamp, when the lamp suddenly exploded, scattering fire in all directions. Mrs. B had presence of mind enough to throw the burning fragments towards a door leading into the yard, but some of the fire fell upon enveloped in flames. Warning her children not to approach her, she endeavored to stifle the fire about her person with a piece of carpet, but finding it impossible, pints \$2; quarts \$3. she ran into the gard, where her cries attracted the attention of Mr. Miller, and sistance.
