GRAIN—Wheat; the sales are 4,500 bush. Milwaukee Club at \$1.20; 1,100 bush. White Kentucky at \$1.95; 200 bush. Oats are dull and heavy; sales of State at 51.5¢, and Western and Canadian at 53.5¢. Corn; sales of 24,000 bush. at 88¢. For Western Mixed; 90¢. for fair Round Yellow; 93¢. for good do.; 93.5¢ for fair to choice Southern Yellow; and 93.9¢ for White Southern.

PROVISIONS—Pork; the sales are 1,850 bbls. at \$16.17 for 25 for New Mess; \$17.25 for thin Mess; \$14.90 for 15 for Prime. Cuts Meats are dull and heavy; sales 314 bbl. and 7½ for Ham in Dry Shoulder, and 8½ for Ham in Salt. Butter and Cheese are dull at former rates.
