"It shall be the duty of said assessors respectively to attend at the place of holding every general, special, or township election during the whole time said electiong is kept open, for the purpose of giving information to the inspectors and judges, when called on smith. in relation to the right of any person assessed by them to rote at such election, and such other matters in relation to the assessments of votes as the said inspectors or judges, or either of them, shall from time to time

require. Agreeably to the provisions of the sixtyfirst section of said act every General and the Poor of Stroud Township. Special election shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten in the forenoon, and shall continue without interruption or adjournment until seven in the evening, when the polis shall be closed.

"No person shall be admitted to vote whose name is not contained in the list of bead. taxable inhabitants furnished by the Commissioners, unless first he produced a receipt for payment within two years, of a State or county tax assessed agreeably to the Constitution, and give satisfactory evidence either on his own oath or the affirmation of another that he has paid such tax, or on failure to produce a receipt, shall make oath to the payment thereof; or, second if he claims a right to vote by being an elector between the ages of 21 and 22 years he shall despose on oath or affirmation that he has resided in the State at least one year next before his application and make such proof of residence that he does verily believe, from the accounts to with promptness and dispatch.

"Every person qualified aforesaid, and who shall make due proof, if required of his esidence and payment of taxes as aforesaid, shall be admitted to vote in the township, ward or district in which he shall reside.

"If any person not qualified to vote in this Commonwealth, agreeably to law, (except the sons of qualified citizens) shall appear at any place of election for the purpose of issuing tickets or influencing the citizens qualfied to vote, he shall on conviction forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars, for every such offience, and be imprisoned for any term not exceeding three
