> Heavy Bank Defalcation, --- The Fulton Bank robbed of \$61,000.

A defalcation in the Fulton Bank, of New York city, came to light a few days since. The amount involved is about \$60,600. The guilty party is W. J Lane, Jr., son of the eashier of the bank. The su-picions of the President were first aroused by statements relating to his fast living, &c. The officers found, upon examination, that Lane had pretended to his father that he was agent of A. B. Dean, of New Jersey, and was collecting drafts payable in Bo-ton and Philadelphia, which being placed to credit of the father at the Fulton Bank, got his father's checks for the proceeds.
