**Balance of outstanding taxes for County purposes for 1859 and previous years** \$6939 97  
Add to this amount balance due by Levi Slutter, late Treasurer \$821 00  
Add also to this amount proceeds of County taxes for 1858 and 1859 on unseated lands, which will be paid in June 1860, making a total of \$1000 00  
Deduct from this amount for outstanding checks, for 1859 and previous years 1126 77  
Leaving a net balance due the county, January 2nd, 1860 of \$7134 20  
It may be proper to state here, that all former County Treasurers are paid off in full, and also, that there are at this time no judgments against the county. The only indebtedness against the county, which is not embraced in the above statement, is the deficit due by the County to the Commonwealth, which is about \$1700 00  
After deducting, which would still leave a net balance due the County of outstanding taxes over and above all indebtedness, by the County, up to Jan. 2nd, 1860 of \$5434 30
