Tornadoes in the West. Louisville, July 23.—At half-past six o'clock yesterday afternoon a tornado passed over this city from the northwest, unroofing several buildings and prostrating a number of trees.

Boats were blown from their moorings and considerable damage done, the amount of which is not yet ascertained. The storm lasted three minutes and was accompanied by hail and rain.

Cleveland, July 22.—A tornado passed over Breckville Station, on the Cleveland and Mahoning Railroad, on Saturday last, entirely destroying the depot, and several dwelling houses and barns, and killing two ladies. Large trees were uprooted and hurled through the air.

The storm was very violent and extended over an area of two miles in length and a quarter of a mile in width.
