Borough Ordinance.

Be it ordained and enacted by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Stroudsburg, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by authority of the same.

Section 1st.—That from and after the first day of October next, no person or persons shall be permitted to erect, keep or maintain any booth, stall, tent, stand or carriage or any other place, for the purpose or use of selling, giving or otherwise disposing of any kind of articles of traffic or mercandize, and particularly such articles as are usually sold by the keepers of Restaurants; such as bread, cakes, meat, porter, ale, cider, or confectionery of any kind, within the lines of any of the streets, lanes or alleys of said Borough.

Section 2d.—If any person or persons shall do or violate this ordinance by erecting, fixing or having any booth, stall, tent, stand or carriage or any other place, for the purpose of vending or otherwise disposing of any of the articles above enumerated, it shall be the duty of the Constable of said Borough, whenever a violation of this ordinance occurs, under the direction of the Chief Burgess to seize such booth, stall, tent, stand or carriage, together with such articles of traffic, and remove the same outside of the limits of said Borough; and it shall also be the duty of said Constable, whenever a warrant for that purpose shall be issued by any Justice of the Peace of said Borough, to levy and collect by a public sale of the articles so removed any sum in the discretion of the Chief Burgess not exceeding five dollars, after having given twelve hours notice of said sale, by not less than three written or printed hand-bills, pasted in public places in said Borough: And the said Constable shall forthwith pay the proceeds of any such sale to the Treasurer of said Borough, first deducting such amount as may be deemed reasonable by the Burgess, as a compensation for the services of said Constable, in discharging the duties imposed by this ordinance.

SHERIFF'S PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "an act regulating the General Elections within the said Commonwealth," passed on the 2d day of July, 1839, it is made the duty of the High Sheriff of every county, to give public notice of such elections to be held, and to make known in such notice what officers are to be elected. Therefore, I MELCHOIR BOSSERD, High Sheriff of the county of Monroe, do make known by this proclamation to the electors of the county of Monroe, that a General Election will be held in said county, on

Tuesday, the 9th of October
next at the several election districts below enumerated, at which time and places are to be elected by the freemen of the county of Monroe.

The freemen of the township of Tankhannock, will hold their election at the house of Sam'l Mildenberger, in said township.

Notice is Hereby Given,

That every person, excepting Justices of the Peace, who shall hold an office or appointment of profit or trust under the United States or of this State or any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer, or agents who is or shall be employed under the legislative, executive or judiciary department of this State or the United States, or of any incorporated district; and also, that every member of Congress, and of the state legisla-ture and of the select or common council of any city, or commissioner of any incorporated district is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time, the office of appointment of judge, inspector, or clerk of any election of this commonwealth, & that no inspector, judge or other officer of such election shall be eligible to be then voted for.

And the said act of Assembly, entitled "an act relating to elections of this commonwealth," passed July 2d, 1839, further provides that the Inspectors and Judges shall meet at the respective places appointed for holding the election in the district to which they respectively belong, before nine o'clock in the morning of the second Tuesday of October, and each of said inspectors shall appoint one clerk, who shall be a qualified voter.

It shall be the duty of said assessors respectively to attend at the place of holding every general, special, or township election during the whole time said election is kept open, for the purpose of giving information to the inspectors and judges, when called on in relation to the right of any person assessed by them to vote at such election, and such other matters in relation to the assessments of votes as the said inspectors or judges, or either of them, shall from time to time require.

Agreeably to the provisions of the sixty-first section of said act every General and Special election shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten in the forenoon, and shall continue without interruption or adjournment until seven in the evening, when the polls shall be closed.

"No person shall be admitted to vote

whose name is not contained in the list of taxable inhabitants furnished by the Commissioners, unless first he produced a receipt for payment within two years, of a State or county tax assessed agreeably to the Constitution, and give satisfactory evidence either on his own oath or the affirmation of another that he has paid such tax, or on failure to produce a receipt, shall make oath to the payment thereof; or, second if he claims a right to vote by being an elector between the ages of 21 and 23 years he shall depose on oath or affirmation that he has resided in the State at least one year next before his application and make such proof of residence in the district as is required by this act, and that he does verily believe, from the accounts given him, that he is of the age aforesaid, and give such other evidence as is required by this act, whereupon the name of the person so admitted to vote shall be inserted in the alphabetical list by the inspectors and a note made opposite thereto, by writing the word 'tax,' if he shall be admitted to vote by reason of having paid tax, or the word 'age,' if he shall be admitted to vote by reason of such age; shall be called out to the clerks, who shall make the like notes in the list of voters kept by them.

"In all cases where the name of the person claiming to vote is found on the list furnished by Commissioners and Assessors, or his right to vote whether thereon or not is objected to by any qualified citizen it shall be the duty of the inspector to examine such person on oath as to his qualifications, and if he claims to have resided within the district for one year or more his oath shall be sufficient proof thereof, but shall make proof at least by one competent witness who shall be a qualified elector that he has resided within the district for more than ten days next preceding such election and shall also himself swear, that his bona fide residence in pursuance of his lawful calling is within the district, and that he did not remove in said district for the purpose of voting therein.

"Every person qualified aforesaid, and who shall make due proof, if required of his residence and payment of taxes as aforesaid, shall be admitted to vote in the township, ward or district in which he shall reside.

"If any person not qualified to vote in this Commonwealth, agreeably to law, (except the sons of qualified citizens) shall appear at any place of election for the purpose of issuing tickets or influencing the citizens qualified to vote, he shall on conviction forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars, for every such offence, and be imprisoned for any term not exceeding three months.

Pursuant to the provision contained in the 6th section of the act aforesaid, the Judges of the aforesaid district shall take charge of the certificate or return of the election of their respective districts and produce them at a meeting of the Judges from each district at the Court House in the Borough of Stroudsburg, on the third day after the day of election, being for the present year on FRIDAY, the 12th of OCTOBER next, then and there to do, and perform the duties required by law of said judges. Also, that where a judge by sickness or unavoidable circumstances, is unable to attend said meeting of Judges, then the certificate or return as aforesaid shall be taken charge of by one of the Inspectors or clerks of the election of said district, who shall do and perform the duties required of said judge unable to attend.

Also, that in the 8th section of the said act it is enacted that "when two or more counties shall compose a district for the choice of member or members of the Senate of this Commonwealth, or of the House of Representatives of the United States or of this commonwealth, the judges of the election in each county, having met as aforesaid, the clerks shall make out a fair statement of all the votes which shall have been given at such election within the county, for every person voted for, as such member or members, which shall be signed by said judges and attested by the clerks, and one of said judges shall take charge of said certificate and shall produce the same at a meeting of one judge from each county at such place in such districts as is or may be appointed by law for such purpose, which meeting shall be held on the seventh day after the election, being for the present on Tuesday the 16th day of October at the Court House in Stroudsburg, Monroe county, for the Representatives return judges, then and there to perform the duties required by law of the aforesaid Assembly district.
