SUPPLEMENT to an act for the equalization of the currency of the State, approved the seventeenth day of April, Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and sixty one.

SEC. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General As sembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the banks of the Commonwealth are hereby required. until the second Tuesday of February next ensuing, to receive at par, in payment of all debts due or to become due to them respectively, the notes of all the solvent banks of the State which paid specie for their liabilities on and immediately prior to the nineteenth day of No vember last, and which shall continue solvent; and the said banks are also here. by authorized to pay out, in all their business transactions and discounts, the said notes so long as the banks lesuing the same shall remain solvent; but in case any president and a majority of the board of directors of any of the said banks should certify to the Governor, under oath or affirmation of the president, that they have just reason to believe that any bank included in said category is in an unsound or upsafe condition, the Governor shall appoint a commission to investigate the same, as provided in the third section of the act of October thirteenth, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven entitled "an Act providing for the resumption of specie payments by the banks, and the relief of debtors," and no bank shall be required to receive the notes of any bank thus discredited until reported sound and solvent by such commission.
