

Good News from France.

By the last arrival from Europe we learn that the Emperor of the French has taken fresh occasion to reiterate the expression of his entire sympathy with the cause for which the Government at Washington is contending; thinks the Union ought to be restored, in spite of the unjustifiable rebellion at the South; and desires to see more energy thrown into the prosecution of the war. He disclaims all thought of interfering with the blockade or the war.

The funeral of General Lyon took place on Thursday afternoon, at Eastport, Ct. Fifteen thousand people were present. The burial was at Phoenixville. Speaker Grow, Gov. Sprague, Gov. Buckingham, Senator Foster, and Richard Busted, E-q., took part in the ceremonies.
