The death of Mr. Durling has cast a gloom over our community. The deceased was probably as well and as favorably knowp throughout our county as any other man in it, and, at the time of his death, was holding the office of Sheriff for the second term. As a faithful public officer, as an enterprising citizen, as an agreeable companion, as a warm and ardent friend, and as a kind husband and father, James N. Durling will long be missed by the community, by his associates and by his family.

The deceased will be buried from his residence, with Masonic honors, this afternoon at 2 o'clock.


