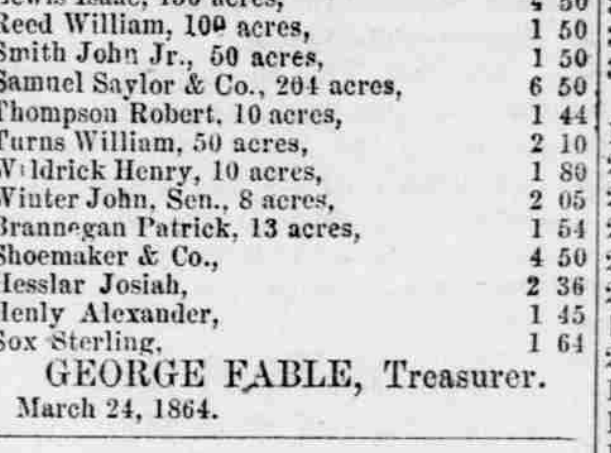

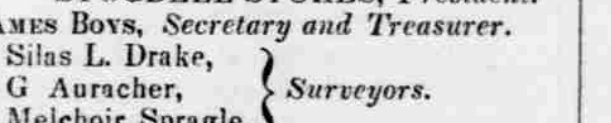

THE PASSENGER TRAIN

Leaves GREAT BEND at 7.40 a. m. after the arrival at 6.30 a. m. of the Cincinnati Express from the West, connecting at Scranton, where it arrives at 10.10 a. m. with a train on the Lackawanna and Bloomsburg Railroad, for Pittston, Wyoming Valley, Kingston and Wilkes-Barre, and by Omnibus with the Delaware and Hudson Railroad at Providence, for Olyphant and Carbondale. At Hope Station this train connects by omnibus with the Belvidere, Delaware Railroad for Phillipsburg, Trenton and Philadelphia.
