

There shall be an additional section to the third article of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows : "SECTION 4. Whenever any of the ualified electors of this Commonwealth hall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the Uhited States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are, or shall be, prescribed by ploy with more certainty of success, where a power-ful alterative is required," their usual place of election." SECTION 2. There shall be two addiional sections to the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight, and nine, as follows : " SECTION 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature, containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation "SECTION 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, in any case, where the authority to grant such powers, or privileges, has been, or may hereafter be, conferred upon the courts of this Commonwealth. 
