Whereas an extraordinary occasion rehad to make the military powers of the State and National defence-

Therefore, I, Andrew G. Curtin, Govby the Constitution, do hereby convene Argus. the General Assembly of this Commonwealth, and require the members of the Schate and House of Representatives to meet in their respective Houses in the Capitol, at Harrisburg, on the ninth day of August, eighteen hundred and sixtyfour, at 12 o'elock, noon, of that day, there and then to deliberate upon and adopt such measures as may in their wisdom be demanded by the exigency of the occasion.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the great seal of the Commonwealth to be affixed, at Harrisbuarg, this first day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and of the Independence of the United States the eighty-ninth.
