The Arrest of Wm. H. H. Bartram.

On Thursday last the Provost Marshall's detectives, arrested Mr. William H. H. Bartram for desertion. Bartram came to this section of country sometime in June last as an ostensible agent for the sale of weather strips for windows and doors.

During his peregrination here it leaked out that Bartram had belonged to the army, and as his walk and conversation was, in every respect, similar to that indulged by those who had taken "French leave" of the recruiting sergeant, it was surmised to be more than probable that if he was just then doing his duty, he would be serving out his time in the army, rather than in giving comfort to rebels.

Bartram's arrest he but mildly condemns, evidently believing it to be right and just, but for Cotter's pocket he has the most vehement appeal—the most heart rending prayer.

We have given vastly more space to this case than its merits demand; but we have done so in order to prepare the public for any outbreak of condemnation which croaking editors and croaking politicians of the Democratic school, may feel called upon to indulge for the purpose of making capital out of it.

The Coal Product of Pennsylvania for 1864. We learn from Ferner's United States Railroad and Mining Register, which is one of the best publications of the kind in the United States, that the entire amount of coal transported over the several Eastern Pennsylvania lines, during 1864, was 10,898,625 tons.

The following shows the amount carried by each of the several coal carrying Companies, viz:— Reading Railroad, 2,763,374; Lehigh Valley Railroad, 1,295,419; Lehigh Canal, 758,087; Del. Lac. & Western Railroad, 1,302,457; Pennsylvania Coal Co., 759,544; Delaware & Hudson Canal, 848,076; Pine Grove & Shamokin, 537,478; Wyoming Canal, 536,089; Semi-Anthracite and Bituminous from Broad Top, Bloomsburg, &c, 9,977,420.

By the arrival of the steamships Evening Star and Fung Shuey, we have news from New Orleans up to the 21st instant. General Gordon Granger was in the city, having temporarily abandoned the prosecution of his expedition in the direction of Mobile.

Within the past ten days an exact record has been kept of the weight of mail matter forwarded from the New York Post-Office over internal routes.

The Vital Doctrine.

Henry C. Cary is publishing a series of essays on the question of tariff duties, from which we quote the following, which expresses the essence of the policy which alone will carry the country through its trials.

To the internal revenue, therefore, must we look for little, if any, less than \$450,000,000. To the enforcement of protection we must look for its enlargement, and thus it is that now, more than ever, we are to look to the tariff as the means of raising revenue.

By order of the Secretary of War, when an enlisted man arrives at a draft rendezvous, any money he may have with him exceeding twenty dollars, will be taken and placed in the hands of the Paymaster at the rendezvous.

The New Lien on Property.—The lien created by the internal revenue law on the property of persons refusing to pay the taxes assessed against them, has attracted perhaps less attention than it deserves.
