OFFICIAL FROM SECRETARY STANTON.

WAR DEPARTMENT, WASHINGTON, D. C., March 13, 1865.

Major-Gen. DIX: The following report of Gen. Sheridan's operations has been received by this department.

EDWIN M. STANTON, Sec. of War. CITY POINT, Va., March 12, 1865.

Hon. EDWIN M. STANTON, Secretary of War: The following dispatch is just received.

U. S. GRANT, Lieut.-Gen. HDQRS. MIDDLE MILITARY DIVISION. Columbia, Va., March 10, 1865.

Lieut.-Gen. U. S. GRANT, Commanding Army United States.

GENERAL: In my last dispatch, dated Waynesborough, I gave you a brief account of the defeat of Early by Custer's Division...

I had to remain at Charlottesville two days. The time was consumed in bringing over from Waynesborough our ammunition and pontoon trains...

In this, however, we were foiled, as both this bridge at Hardwickville were burned by the enemy upon our approach...

The Third Division started at the same time from Charlottesville, and proceeded down the Lynchburg Railroad to Amherst Court House...

The dam across the James at this point was also partially destroyed. Everybody is bewildered by our movements...

The latest Richmond paper was of the 4th, but contained nothing. I omitted to mention that the bridges on the railroad from Swoop's Depot...

The weather has been very bad indeed, raining hard every day with the exception of four days, since we started...

Up to the present time we have captured fourteen pieces of artillery, eleven at Waynesborough, and three at Charlottesville...

The party that I sent back from Waynesborough started with six pieces, but they were obliged to destroy two of the six for want of animals...

We have captured up to the present time twelve canal boats laden with supplies, ammunition, rations, needed stores, etc.

I cannot speak in too high terms of Generals Merritt, Custer and Devins, and the officers and men of their commands...

Commodore Hollins of the Rebel navy was shot near Gordonsville while attempting to make his escape from our advance in that direction.
