

New Counterfeits.

A dangerous counterfeit of the one dollar Treasury notes, issued by the General Government, has made its appearance. Excepting a few minor discrepancies, the spurious note is an exact fac simile of the bill. The general appearance of the bill is also very good. The green ink is of a somewhat lighter shade than that used on the genuine, and some parts of the note look scratched and blurred. The figures 1 on the scroll work on the lower right corner of the note are printed in green; in the genuine they are white. The face of Chase, in the counterfeit, is badly executed, but otherwise the work is well done, and the note well calculated to deceive.

Counterfeit five of the National Banks, well executed, are also in circulation. The color of the paper is a little paler than the genuine. They are, however, easily detected by observing the position of the letter "T" in the word "this" in letter reading. This note is secured by bonds of "The Union" in the genuine is over the left portion of the letter "I" in "United," while in the counterfeit it is further to the left, over middle of the "N" of the same word.

Singular Death.

A singular and sad accident occurred a few days since to a Mr. Pellet, an old and much respected citizen of Palmyra township, Pike Co., which resulted in his death. He had recently lost four of his cattle by poison or some other unknown cause, and while engaged in skinning them run a small briar in his arm. He thoughtlessly took the knife that he had been using in skinning the cattle, to take it out, thereby inoculating himself with the poison from the animals. His arm at once commenced to swell, baffling all the efforts of medical skill, and a few days after the occurrence, he died.

Special Notice.

Section 83, of the act to provide "Internal Revenue," &c., as by amendment of March 3d, 1865, provides that upon the amounts, quantities, and values of produce, goods, wares, merchandise and articles produced or manufactured and sold or delivered, the manufacturer or producer thereof, shall pay to the Collector of Internal Revenue within his district, monthly within (10) ten days from the 20th of each month, the duties on such products or manufactures.

And for neglect to pay such duties within said (10) ten days the amount of such duties, with the addition prescribed (10 per cent penalty, costs, &c.,) may be levied upon the real and personal property of any such producer or manufacturer."

Section 5 of the amendment of March 3, 1865, imposes, in addition to the duties before prescribed, "an increase of one-fifth or 20 per cent. of the duties or rates of duty now provided whether ad valorem or specific.
