Special Notice.

Section 83, of the act to provide "Internal Revenue," &c., as by amendment of March 3d, 1865, provides that upon the amounts, quantities, and values of produce, goods, wares, merchandise and articles produced or manufactured and sold or delivered, the manufacturer or producer thereof, shall pay to the Collector of Internal Revenue within his district, monthly within (10) ten days from the 20th of each month, the duties on such products or manufactures.

And for neglect to pay such duties within said (10) ten days the amount of such duties, with the addition prescribed (10 per cent penalty, costs, &c.) may be levied upon the real and personal property of any such producer or manufacturer.

Section 5 of the amendment of March 3, 1865, imposes, in addition to the duties before prescribed, "an increase of one fifth or 20 per cent. of the duties or rates of duty now provided whether ad valorem or specific."
