The Cold "Snap."

From Sunday noon to Monday near noon, we had extremely cold weather .-Nor was it confined to any particular lo eality, but extended far and wide. In this place and vicinity the mercury ran ged from 9 to 15 degrees below zero .-In Philadelphia it ranged from 14 to 18 degrees below zero, which is said to be the coldest weather ever known there .-In Belfast, Maine, the thermometer indicated 20 degrees below zero, while at Bangor it was 30 degrees below zero .-In Petersburg Virginia, at sunset, on Sunday, the mercury was 3 degrees below zero, which is exceedingly cold for that region. At Troy, New York, the mercu ry was 20 degrees below zero on Monday morning-while at Carmel N. Y. it was 26 below, and at Albany it was 15 de grees below zero. At Lowville, N. Y. the mercury was 28 degrees below zero, while at Utica, N. Y., it was 31 degrees
