

The Pennsylvania Railroad.
The annual report of the business of the Penna. Railroad Company, for the year 1866, was read before the annual meeting of shareholders on Tuesday February 19, in Philadelphia. From it we learn that the capital of the company is \$20,000,000. The mortgage debt is \$9,884,840, and other liabilities \$15,378,894—making an aggregate of \$45,263,737. The cost of railroad and branches is put down at \$13,500,000. In addition, the company claims credit for the Harrisburg Railroad, \$1,885,530; Columbia Railroad and State Canals, \$6,600,000; equipment of road, \$3,361,215; real estate and telegraph line, \$3,471,431, and extension of trunk line west to the Monongahela, and east to the Delaware, \$2,121,157—making an aggregate of \$30,896,403. The company presents other credits in bills receivable, stocks, bonds, &c., to the amount of \$15,247,742. The gross earnings of the road, and of the roads worked in connection with it, except the Philadelphia, and Erie road, for the past year are \$16,583,882, and the total expenses, ordinary and extraordinary, \$12,790,969—leaving an excess of \$3,792,913. The whole number of passengers carried in 1866 was 2,861,336, and during the past year 2,673,598. The average distance traveled by each passenger was 52 miles, and the previous year 7 1/2 miles, this difference being due to the larger amount of through travel and troops in 1866. The freight carried was 3,452,748, embracing 1,413,171 tons of coal. The increase in the coal traffic is 339,424 tons, and the whole tonnage of the road exceeds that of 1865, 653,908 tons, or nearly 25 per cent. The working expenses were 64 per cent. of gross receipts on the Company's roads. The company's canals in the year earned \$297,867, against \$181,915 for 1865.—The expenses were \$233,438—showing a net profit of \$64,429.

The President's Salary.
The notion that the President receives but \$25,000 a year to pay all his household expenses, and the dignity of his office, though very generally entertained, is quite erroneous. It would be difficult to make both ends meet in these tight times, were such the fact. But it is far otherwise. On the contrary, most of the later Presidents have managed to save something out of their salary. Of course the President has no rent to pay. His house is furnished from top to bottom by Congress, not an article being paid for out of his own pocket. His fuel is supplied at the national expense; all his servants are paid by special appropriations; his stable is kept by the same means; and so are his flower garden and kitchen garden, his conservatories, and his pleasure grounds. Even his balls and dinner parties are paid for out of the public purse. Some idea of the amount expended by Congress for the support of the Presidency may be formed by considering the following items in the last appropriation bill:

Fuel for the President's house,	\$12,000
Painting the President's house,	8,000
Repairing the Conservatory of the President's house,	10,000
Refurnishing the President's house,	76,000
Lighting the President's house, Capitol, &c.,	110,000
	\$216,000

These items by no means include all the expenditures for the White House.

An Unpublished Incident of the Rebel Congress.
It is stated that a few months before the fall of Richmond, Va., while the rebel Congress was deeply concerned about the cruelty and barbarity of the North, a woman of that city walked into the House of Representatives and attacked three members with a cowhide, castigating them mercilessly. At last the Speaker caught the virago in his arms, and held her there until she went into hysterics.—She said her intention was to chastise the entire body because of its abuse of the North, and she made a very good commencement certainly. After her departure the House passed a resolution that the body recommend to the press the impropriety of making public the unhappy incident, as a matter calculated to bring reproach upon the dignity of Southern legislators. The Richmond papers never mentioned the unhappy circumstance, and only recently was the story told by a reconstructed member of the defunct House.

Railroads in the Union States.
The Railroad Journal publishes a table showing the number of miles of Railroad finished and in process of construction in the various States of the Union, from which we learn that there are completed and in progress within the limits of the United States, 55,606 miles, of which 36,896 are completed. The total cost of these works is set down at \$1,502,464,875. Pennsylvania has 4,649 miles of road completed and under way, of which 4,037 are completed. Ohio comes next, with a total of 3,074 miles, of which 3,402 are completed. New York has only 3,305 miles, of which 3,025 are completed. The cost of construction in Pennsylvania, owing to her rough and uneven surface, is considerably in excess of other States.

To Holders of Government Bonds.
As inquiries are constantly made respecting the conversion of the 7-30 Notes in 5-20 Bonds, it is stated for the benefit of those interested that 7-30's of August, 1864, from which the last coupon was detached on the 15th of February '67, will be convertible August 15th next, when six months' interest will be paid, and 5-20 Bonds dated August 16, 1867, will be given.

The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, at Philadelphia, decided that the shares in National banks are subject to State taxation in the hands of the shareholders. Judge Agnew delivered the opinion of Court. Chief Justice Woodward dissented.
