

Provost Marshal General's Report.
We have received a printed copy of the Final Report of the Provost Marshal General of the United States, which gives a detailed statement of the transaction of each District Provost Marshal's office. The following extracts will be of interest to the citizens of the 11th District of Penna., inasmuch as the information could not before be obtained in consequence of an order prohibiting Provost Marshals from making public the business of their office.

The Provost Marshal's office of the 11th District of Penna. was opened at Easton on the 16th day of May, 1863, and closed Dec. 21st, 1865—a period of nearly three years. During this time the records and business of the 6th, 10th and 12th Penna. Districts were transferred to the office of the 11th District for settlement, and Col. Yohe appointed Provost Marshal over all the territory included in these districts, in addition to the 11th originally in his charge. The first U. S. draft was made in the 11th District in September, 1863, and those following at different times in 1864, the result was as follows:—

By the above figures it will be seen that the total number of men drafted in the various drafts was 8068—of which number 259 were held in personal service, 234 furnished substitutes, 1935 paid commutation, (yielding to the Government \$595,500.) and 2275 are, under the law, considered deserters.

During the time the 11th Dist. office was in operation 869 deserters were arrested, 21,760 letters written and copied, 8,650 muster rolls and 7,400 enlistment papers completed, 6,652 daily, weekly and monthly reports rendered, 63,370 names registered, 28,060 pages record written, and seventy two separate and distinct records kept; besides, many other important papers written, such as certificates, discharges, furloughs, &c., which our space will not permit to mention.

The entire cost of the office of the 11th District for the entire time, was \$30,445.56, which includes salaries to officers and employees, printing, postage, transportation, &c., &c.

When we take into consideration the extreme exactness with which every portion of the records must have been kept to arrive at the above figures, we are forced to the conclusion that a strict compliance with "red tape" rules and regulations after all is the only method of conducting business of any kind correctly and systematically—notwithstanding the uninitiated, careless and impulsive people consider it a bore and waste of time.—*Easton Daily Express.*

Enforcing the Law in Detail.
Some time ago a citizen of Carbon township, Huntington county, brought 500 suits for his use and the use of the Directors of the Poor of Huntington county, against the Powellton Coal and Iron Company, together with some 140 suits against Wm. A. Orbison, for making and passing shipplasters in violation of law, which having been proven, judgments were entered against the defendants for five dollars and costs in each case, amounting it is said, to \$3,200 and costs. That's what we can fairly call enforcing the law in detail, and it is right.
