Commutation to Prisoners.

Congress has provided by law that soldiers, sailors and marines, who were captured during the war and held as prisoners shall be allowed, as a commutation for their rations, the sum of twenty five cents per day. This money is paid by the Commissary-General of Prisoners at Washington, and it is necessary that the names of the claimants shall appear upon his books. The act of Congress only permits the payment to be made to privates in the land and naval forces. Officers are not entitled. Notwithstanding this fact, many of the latter have applied for the commutation and others may yet apply. To save trouble, it is proper that the conditions of the law should be understood. As there are many private soldiers, marines and sailors, who have not yet made application, it is well that they should do so at once, before the payments are closed.—Inquirer.

Acts have passed the Legislature giving the Commissioners of Northampton county, \$3 per day; giving the county auditors of Northumberland county \$3 a day, and the supervisors and township auditors of the different townships \$1.50 per day; giving the assessors of Lehigh county \$2 a day for their services; allowing the county commissioners and auditors of Monroe Co. \$2.50 a day for their services; allowing the treasurer of Lehigh county \$1,000 per annum in addition to the compensation now received by him for the collection of money due the State.

Worth Knowing.

If people planting orchards would give strict orders to mark the north side of trees with red chalk before they are taken up, and when set out to have the tree put in the ground with the north side to the north, in its natural position, a large proportion would live. Ignoring this law of nature is one cause of so many transplanted trees dying. If the north side is exposed to the South the heat of the sun is too great on that side of the tree to bear, and therefore it dries up and decays.

Senator James L. Graham, of Allegheny county, was elected Speaker of the Pennsylvania Senate prior to the adjournment last week. The term of Speaker Hall expires before the Legislature meets again. It is customary for the Senate to elect a Speaker from among the members holding over, to provide for filling any possible vacancy in the office of Governor.

Promissory notes are liable to a stamp duty of five cents for each \$100 or fractional part thereof. If a note contains any special agreement, such as waiving the stay of execution, right to inquisition, appeal, or exemption, it is liable to an additional duty of five cents. Notes containing a confession of judgment are liable to an additional stamp of fifty cents.
