Their method of business is as follows: they enter a county in which they wish to practice their scoundrelism a party of twelve or fifteen men, with women and children, fine buggies and splendid teams of horses, all in princely style, having one man whose only business was to pay the bills, another to superintend the horses. The mode of proceeding is the same nearly in all cases. They show a beautiful model of Palmer's Hay Pake, and propose to make the person an agent and sell him a right for \$100. The person hesitates; they then assure him he cannot lose, as he will not be required to pay any money until he shall have realized in profits \$200 from sales-the wholesale price of the rake to be \$40, retail \$85. They give him a certificate of membership acknowledging the receipt of agreement, but signed neither in writing or printing, that no part of the \$100 shall victim to sign an order or receipt, merely absolute promissory note to pay Palmer \$100 one year from date.
