JUDGE SHARSWOOD ON LEGAL TENDERS.

Extract from His Opinion in the Case of Borie vs. Trott.

"On the whole, then, I am of opinion that the provision of the act of Congress of February 25th, 1862, declaring the notes issued in pursuance of that act to be lawful money, and a legal tender, is UNCONSTITUTIONAL."

"This renders it unnecessary that I should consider the other question which has been made, as to the effect of the special agreement to pay in lawful silver money of the United States. I am in favor of entering judgment for the plaintiff, but as a majority of the court are of a different opinion, judgment for the defendant."—Copied from the Philadelphia Age of 23d of February, 1864, where the opinion is published in full.

It may also be found in the Legal Intelligence of March 18, 1864, page 92.

In the same copy of the Age is a carefully prepared eulogy of the judge and this opinion, in which is the following:

"Judge Sharswood reasons upon and decides the case as if he were some lofty spirit sitting far above and out of the contentions and strifes of the world."

Will not the holders of greenbacks and Government bonds consider the judge as quite too elevated and ethereal for such earthly honors as a seat on the Supreme Bench.

Court Proceedings.

The several Courts of Monroe County commenced on Monday of last week, Associate Judges Levering and De Young upon the Bench.

The Grand Jury was organized by the appointment of Edward Brown, Esq., of Stroud, as foreman.

The absence of the President Judge, Barrett, who was detained at home on account of illness in his family, prevented the trial of any but criminal cases, several of which were disposed of by the Associates.

The Grand Jury, at the Court held last week, returned the bill against James Dowling, charged with dealing in counterfeit greenbacks, ignoramus. No evidence having been introduced to show any connection, on his part, with such business. We noticed the matter two weeks ago as an item of news, merely because of the notoriety it had gained from the hearing before Esq. Rees, and are glad to be able to notice this final result before the Grand Jury. We regretted to see the course of the Democrat, of last week, in relation to this matter. Our neighbor strives to create the impression that it was solely an attempt to levy black mail on the part of the detectives, but does not say a word about the aid afforded these detectives by prominent Democrats in securing the arrest of Mr. Dowling. His reference to "black Republican times" in this connection, is also out of order, in view of the fact that Andrew Johnson, the Commander-in-Chief, in such matters, in spite of Republican protest, heads the detective column, and the Democratic column at the same time.
