GENERAL NEWS.

The internal revenue receipts during last week amount to \$5,485,629.

At the Nashville election, on Saturday, the Republicans were successful.

At the election in Memphis, on Saturday, the Republican ticket was successful by a majority of from 500 to 1000.

The defeat of the ambitious Governor of Maryland for the United States Senatorship is regarded as the last note of the dying Swann.

It is reported that Gen. Burnside has reconsidered his acceptance of the Republican nomination of Governor of Rhode Island, and will decline it.

The California Senate has requested Gov. Haight immediately to telegraph to Washington its resolutions commending the action of Congress.

An avalanche at Keystone, Sierra Co., Cal., on the 4th inst., buried 17 men in the snow. Nine were killed. Several buildings were destroyed.

The Sergeant-at-Arms of the Senate waited on President Johnson at 4 P. M. on Saturday, and served on him the summons to appear at the Court of Impeachment.

A great freshet prevails in the North-West. By the breaking of the ice-gorge at Aurora, Ill., on Saturday several dams and bridges were swept away. The water is higher than ever before.

The wages of four prominent Europeans are as follows: Napoleon, \$13,240 a day; Queen Victoria, \$927; Francis Joseph, \$10,059, and the King of Prussia, \$8210.

Since the beginning of the present fiscal year, July 1st, 1867, the total receipts of internal revenue have been \$134,828,013.88—a great falling off. Last week the receipts were \$5,484,629.44.

The proposed amendment to the Wisconsin Constitution giving the right of suffrage to women was killed in the Assembly a few days ago. The resolution submitting it to a vote at the election in 1868 was lost—Yeas, 30; Nays, 41.

Col. Grau, the author of the Ordinance under which Arkansas seceded in 1861, and ex-Gov. Reeder, a leading Confederate, have both declared in favor of Reconstruction. Col. Grau says it is the most generous offer ever extended to a free people.

The Charleston Mercury still keeps up its courteous heading for the South Carolina Convention—"The Great Ring Streaked and Striped Negro Convention." The Mercury is owned and edited by the elite of Palmetto chivalry and aristocracy.

John Forsyth of the Mobile Register tenses Andrew Johnson aside. He says Johnson never affiliated with Democrats, that he allowed the Philadelphia Convention to fail, and declined to turn out Republican office holders to give place to the hungry Democracy.

In Charleston they are beginning to admit that white men (if they are "poor whites") may work for a living. One merchant is hiring white men to load and unload vessels, instead of negroes heretofore employed. When white men throughout the South roll up their sleeves and go to work restoration will be half accomplished and Southern property assured.

The President has approved the following bill, viz: If any person or persons entitled to the bounty provided by sections 12 and 13 of the act making appropriations for the civil service, approved July 28, 1868, or shall die before receiving said bounty, his shall be paid to the heirs of the soldiers as designated in said act, in the order therein named, and to none other.

A new post office bill has been introduced into the Senate, which contains among other things a wholesome provision against the lottery swindlers. The sending of circulars of lotteries, gift certificates, and similar devices through the mails is prohibited, permission being given to post-masters to send such missives to the Dead Letter Office. This is properly enforced will have a tendency to break up a system of fraud of gigantic proportions.

No grindstone should be exposed to the weather, as it not only injures the wood-work, but the sun's rays render the stone so much as, in time, to render it useless. Neither should it run in water, as the part remaining in the water softens so much that it wears away faster than the other side; and many a "soft place" in a stone has arisen from this cause alone, and not from any inequality in the grit.
