MARTINSVILLE, Clinton Co., April 23. To the Editor of the Cincinnati Gazette: I have seen and read in your valuable paper a treatment for chickens and other fowls, for "poultry diseases." We lost a great many chickens from the above, and I inspected several; found diseased liver and enlargement of the heart. I then put them upon the following: Calomel 30 grains; pulverized resin, 60 grains; add 1 gallon of corn meal, and mix well; give twice per week. Since I commenced the above we have not lost one.
