

Buchanan's Estates.
The appraisal of the personal property of the late James Buchanan, as filed in the Register's office of Lancaster county, sums up a total estimate of the value of \$330,582. The wines and liquors on hand were worth \$800. He had bonds of the Pennsylvania railroad; of Hamilton county, O.; of railroads and mining companies in the Western, Middle, and Eastern States, of the State of Virginia, of the State of Pennsylvania, a large amount of bonds and mortgages, bank stocks, a deposit of \$8,300 with the banking house of Baring, London; but not one dollar in the hands of the United States. There is a pertinent significance in this fact. The ex-President had no faith in the Government which he administered, and as he expected to be the last of the Presidents, he could not be expected to risk any of his fortune in a nation which he believed about to undergo an entire change of government, from a democracy to a monarchy.

Naturalization.
A bill introduced by Mr. Conkling, yesterday provides for the annulling and revocation by the Court which issues it, or by any United States District Court of the certificate of naturalization of any person who, if it shall be made appear, was not at the time the said certificate purports to have been issued entitled to be naturalized under the laws of the United States; or if the certificate held by any person claiming its benefits, who shall be proved to be not the person mentioned therein as entitled to its benefits, shall issue upon complaint on oath of any person, or upon certificate of the Judges of Registration of Election showing probable cause after examination on oath of the party suspected or accused.
