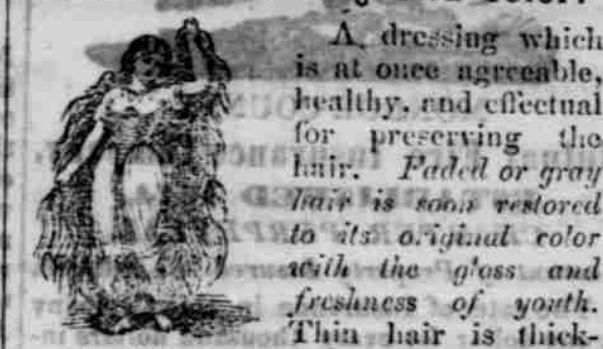

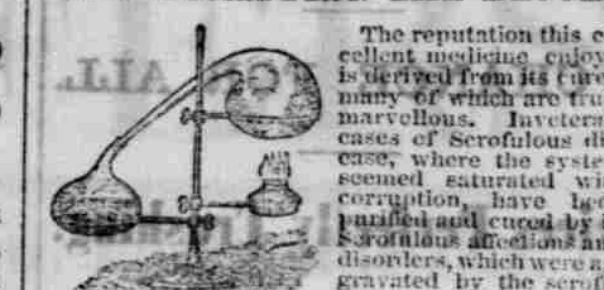

PUBLIC NOTICE.

AT A MEETING OF THE TOWN Council, held at the usual place of meeting, on Friday evening, July 17th, 1868, it was unanimously Resolved, That the following ordinance be published in the "Jeffersonian" and the "Monroe Democrat" for the information of the public: "AN ORDINANCE"

Relating to nuisances, &c., on the Streets, Lanes, Alleys, and Sidewalks of the Borough of Stroudsburg. SECTION 1.—Be it enacted by the Burgess and Assistants, or Common Council of the Borough of Stroudsburg, in council met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the said ordinance, that from and after the passage of this ordinance, it shall not be lawful for any person, or persons, to obstruct any of the streets, lanes, alleys, or sidewalks of the said borough, with vehicles of any kind, lumber, logs, cordwood, boxes, barrels, bricks, stones, dirt, sand, or with any other material or thing of any kind whatsoever, and that any such obstructions hereby declared to be a nuisance and subject to a preliminary abatement, by removal or otherwise, by the street committee, after twenty-four hours notice to the parties so obstructing the said streets, lanes, alleys, or sidewalks, given by one or more of said committee to remove the same, which abatement or removal shall, where the parties refuse or neglect to do so, after notice as aforesaid, be made by, or under the direction of, the said street committee, at the expense of the parties, as aforesaid, causing said obstruction, with twenty per centum added to the cost thereof, as directed by the Act of Assembly in such cases made and provided.

SECTION 2.—Any person building, or about to build, before laying any building material upon any of the streets, lanes, alleys, or sidewalks of the said borough is hereby required to take out a permit, which shall be issued on application to the Chief Burgess, to occupy so much of any such street, lane, alley or sidewalk, without causing any unnecessary obstruction thereof, as may be necessary for the purposes of said building, which permit shall, in no instance, be granted for a longer period than three months, nor, under any circumstances, be construed to permit the obstruction of gutters; Provided, That upon satisfactory cause being shown the said permit may be renewed from time to time, at the discretion of the Burgess. A failure to comply with the requirements of this section, will subject all material, and the owner, or owners, thereof, to all the penalties of section 1 of this Ordinance, after due notice to remove the same, and failure to do so, as provided in said section.

SECTION 3.—All Ordinances, or parts of Ordinances, or By-Laws, now in force, conflicting with the provisions of this Ordinance, are hereby repealed.
