In Stroudsburg, on the 19th inst. Mrs. Harriet Jackson, wife of Dr. A. Reeves Jackson, after a lingering illness, aged 45 years and 2 months.

The deceased was the eldest daughter of the late Stroud J. Hollinshead, and was born in Stroudsburg, Nov. 19th, 1823. She was married to Dr. A. Reeves Jackson, May 19th 1850, and leaves a devoted husband, an indulgent mother and brother, four affectionate children and a large circle of relatives and friends to mourn her loss.

In the death of Mrs. Jackson, we have an other sad reminder that, indeed "death loves a shining mark." Surrounded by everything that heart could wish—protected by all the safeguards which a husband's, a mother's, a brother's and children's love could throw around her—close nestled in the hearts of our whole community because of her exemplary character, her christian walk and conversation, her unflinching urbanity and her unostentatious charities and virtues—she would have thought the icy hand of the fell destroyer would have allowed her to remain; but not so. The prize was too bright—too noble—and, breaking all barriers, disease and death claimed her in the midst of her usefulness, and took her from us—Sad thought! and yet there is food for rejoicing mingled with the sadness. She died not as one without hope. For years she had contemplated the stern truth that "all must die;" and in those years her efforts have all been to draw closer to God, that she might walk in communion with Him. Several years ago, feeling it to be a duty, she united herself with the Presbyterian Church; and though her piety has not been of the strictly demonstrative kind, in her meekness, her gentleness, her kindness, her benevolence, her regular attendance upon the services of the sanctuary, her earnest devotion to every thing which promised to aid in the advancement of the cause of her Divine Master, her patience which led her to bear the sufferings of a painful and protracted illness without a murmur, and in her calm, peaceful and triumphant death, we have the best evidence that her dying was but the passing of her immortal spirit from this mortal body of disease and pain, to a perfect existence among the blessed in Heaven.

On all who knew her, her death will fall as a heavy sorrow indeed. On companions because of the loss of a friend—true, confident and worthy of the most unbounding love. On the poor and suffering, because the hand that so kindly ministered to their wants and the voice which so feelingly cheered them in their sufferings are forever still in death. On the church, because she has lost an ardent supporter and a most earnest worshipper. On her family—but who can measure the length, the breadth, the height and the depth of affliction here. Words have no power in such computation; and yet all—companions, the poor, the church and the family may find consolation and comfort in the sweet words of the poetess, which apply with so much truthfulness to her whose loss we mourn:

"Farwell! thy life has left surviving love  
A wealth of records and sweet feelings given,  
From sorrow's heart the faintness to remove  
By whispers breathing less of earth than heaven.  
Thus rests thy spirit still on those with whom  
Thy step the path of joyous duty trod,  
Bidding them make an altar of thy tomb,  
Where chastened thoughts may offer praise to God."

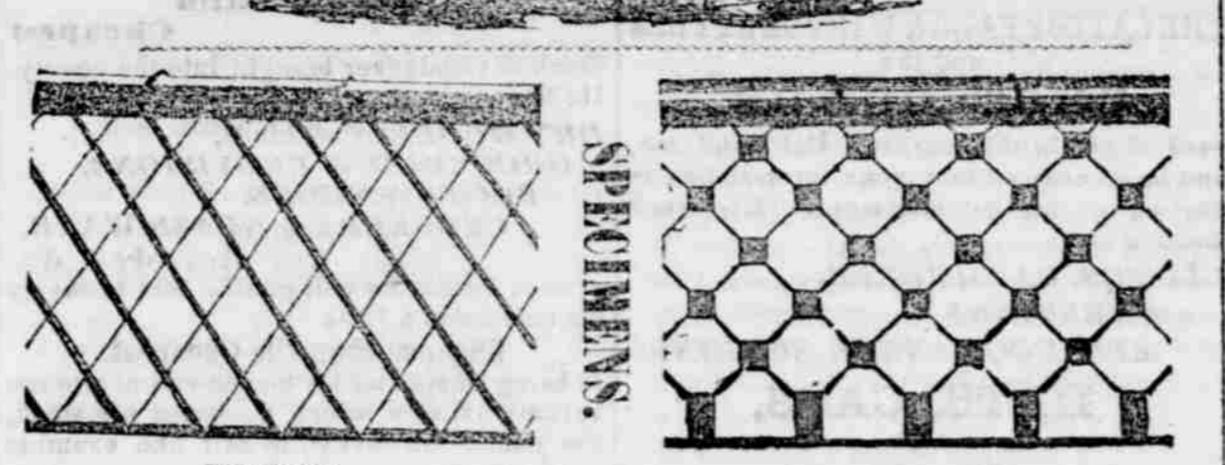
