

Big Raid of Prison Birds. SING SING, N. Y., March 15.—Two serious breaks were made by the convicts at this prison to-day. The first occurred between three and four o'clock this morning. At that hour Mr. Thomas Forrest, one of the night keepers, proceeded to cells No. 13, 28, and 81, and unlocked them, letting out convicts Decker, Lockwood, Mullery, Muller, and John Burns, to take them to the mess to get breakfast for the other convicts. Soon after leaving the cells, and when passing through the chapel, two of the convicts seized and struck Forrest and gagged him, lying him down and passing on to the mess room, where Edwin Craft, the night guard, was stationed. They also seized and gagged him, and then all five of them made their escape from the roof. When Craft was found he was dead, having been strangled by the gag and was lying on his face. The alarm was given and every effort was made to re-arrest the escaped convicts. They succeeded in arresting two, Burns and Mullery, in a barn at Tarrytown. Forrest's injuries were but slight, the convicts seeming to have taken care not to hurt him. He was, however, severely gagged, and his hands and feet were tied. About one o'clock this afternoon another attempt was made by another squad of convicts to get away, which was more desperate than the first. At that hour three convicts approached the guard on the middle dock, saying they had a pass which they wished to show him. He advanced without his arms, when they immediately advanced towards him with huge knives. He rushed for his musket but was soon overpowered, though not hurt, when the three convicts now joined by others, made a rush for the sloop Exchange which was lying at the dock laden with lumber. Provided with arms seized from the guard house, they ordered the men of the vessel and attempted to jump on board. By this time the alarm had spread and a fresh arrival of guards came upon the scene and rapid firing of muskets began, some twenty shots in all being fired. The convicts being unable to get the vessel away from the dock, and seeing that they were overpowered, succumbed and were taken back to prison. The following is a list of the injured: James McCauley, shot three times in the body, will probably not recover; a convict named Allen was also badly hurt. The slightly injured are Timothy Donovan, Daniel O'Connell, Edward McGinn, Dannelly, and Miller. The two who are dangerously injured were recently sent here for twenty years from New York City. Coroner McEntee, of Croton, is now holding an inquest over the body of Craft. It is not expected that a verdict will be reached to-day. While the noon rebellion was going on it was thought that a general revolt was about to transpire. Therefore a telegram was sent to Sing Sing village for help. It was responded to immediately by hundreds of men, armed with all sorts of weapons, and the excitement was great. This afternoon all is quiet, and will probably remain so through the night. None of the guard or officers of the prison were hurt.

Among the appointments made last week by President Grant was that of Mrs. Van Lew, to be post mistress at Richmond, Virginia. It is said this lady rendered valuable services to the Government during the war, frequently aiding our prisoners to escape from rebel dungeons and sending slaves through the lines with important information to Gen. Grant. It is owing mainly to this that the appointment was made.

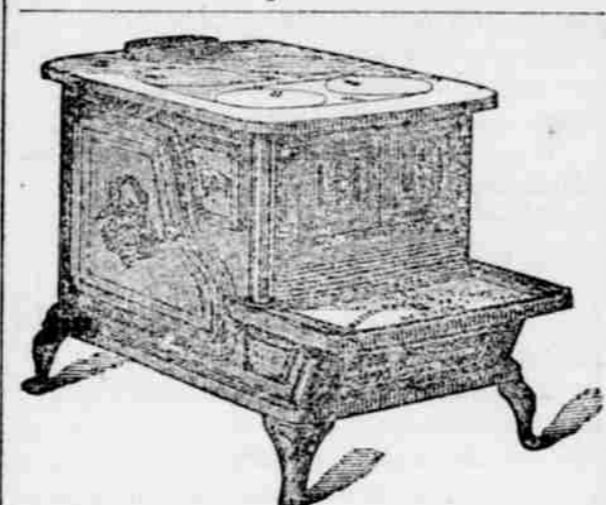
