The Stroudsburg Lodge, No. 602 I. O. G. T., celebrated their Third Anniversary, at their Hall, in this Borough, on Tuesday evening.

At a convention of delegates held in Stroudsburg, June 21, it was resolved to hold a Camp Meeting at Delaware Water Gap, Pa., Aug. 22, 1871.

The Delaware peach crop this year is likely to be the largest ever known. A meeting of the Fruit-Growers' Association was held at Dover, on Tuesday, at which it was estimated that over three and a quarter millions of baskets will be sent to market by railroad.
