

Clams and Oysters.

The legislature of this State, at its late session, passed a clam and oyster law. which interests all persons engaged in that trade. First section prohibits the sale of clams or oysters in this State during July and August. Fine and imprisoment for offering them. Second section prohibits all sales without license, from wagons, etc. This section provides for li cense by city or county treasurers, to run one year. Fourth section prohibits any person from selling clams or oysters in this State, unless he has license, under a penalty of a fine of fifty to three hundred dollars, and an imprisoment not to exceed six months. Fifth section provides that in this State clams and oysters shall only be sold by the count.
