

Not Sick—but Twenty Years in Bed.

Among the recent deaths in Germany (says the *Pall Mall Gazette*) there is announced that of a man whose character and career supplies a curious commentary on the principle of "hereditary genius"—the eldest son of Wilhelm von Humboldt. He had in common with his father and uncle both name and wealth, besides this absolutely nothing. As to the rest of his career, all that can be said of this small scion of a great house is that he was proprietor of the estate of Ottmacha, in Silesia, a very fine and large property, which had been given to his father as reward for his services to the Prussian State. Also that his death took place in Berlin, and that he was buried at Regel, the sepulcher of his great namesakes.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF PENNSYLVANIA.
JOINT RESOLUTION
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania.
Be it Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment of the Constitution of this Commonwealth be proposed to the people for their adoption or rejection, pursuant to the provisions of the tenth article thereof, to wit:
AMENDMENT.
Strike out the Sixth Section of the Sixth Article of the Constitution, and insert in lieu thereof the following:
"A State Treasurer shall be chosen by the qualified electors of the State, at such times and for such term of service as shall be prescribed by law."
