

The Governor's Thanksgiving Proclamation.

His Excellency, the President of the United States, having, by his proclamation set apart Thursday, the thirtieth day of November, 1871, as a day of National Thanksgiving.

Now, therefore I, John W. Geary, Governor of Pennsylvania, do hereby cordially commend to the people thereof the observance of the same as a day of thanks giving to Almighty God for our State, national and individual blessings, and of prayer for the continuance of His gracious favor.

As entirely as may be possible let business pursuits be suspended. Let us spend the day in religious worship, and in such sacred communings and festivities of the home circle, and so secure its pleasure and perform its duties as to make our hearts more deeply sensible of our obligations to God and our fellow men.

"Whose oaths praise glorify me." "He that hath pity upon the poor lendeth unto the Lord, and that which he hath given will He pay him again."

Given under my hand and the great seal of the State at Harrisburg this twenty-sixth day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy one, and of the Commonwealth the ninety sixth.

Pennsylvania Sunday School Relief.

OFFICE OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE PENNSYLVANIA STATE SABBATH SCHOOL ASSOCIATION.

PHILADELPHIA, October 17, 1871.

To All Whom it May Concern:

At a meeting of the Pennsylvania State Sabbath School Association, held this day, it was unanimously resolved to set on foot the following movement:

We propose that the scholars of all the Sunday Schools of our State be called upon to contribute to the relief of the sufferers by the late fires in the West and Northwest.

We suggest that at least one of the four Sabbaths in November (which one, to be determined by Sunday School Superintendents and pastors in each locality) be set apart in which to gather these collections.

James W. Weir, Esq., of Harrisburg, Cashier of the Harrisburg National Bank, will act as Treasurer of this "Sunday School Relief Fund." To him the sums collected may be remitted by drafts or post office orders.

Acknowledgment will be made of the sums contributed by each school, by name, if desired, in the official documents of the Association, or in such other way as may be deemed best.

County secretaries of organized counties; pastors of the churches; men of the press; parents, superintendents, teachers, and all Sunday School people, are hereby invited and urged to lend their active co-operation in the object of this call.

We shall not say one word to commend the cause. You know the need. We are persuaded that our Sunday Schools will, to a child, respond. You may be assured of the utmost care in that the exercise of the trust assumed, and that the benefactions bestowed will be wisely distributed in the most needed directions, especially not forgetting, in the claims of the great city, the suffering that has come upon the burnt towns and villages of the Northwestern frontier.

The hopes that we centre in the Sunday-school children of our State we feel sure will not disappoint us in this matter. Will you not lend them in one of the grandest opportunities for the exercise of a practical beneficence?

Celery.

A correspondent writes: We could never account for the fact that so few farmers and villagers undertake to raise this excellent esculent. It is easily raised, easily kept through the winter, affording an excellent relish for meats and flavoring soups, and is very wholesome. The seeds should be sown now in rows on rich soil. Keep clear of weeds, and when the plants get four leaves shear them off to induce stocky growth; and as they grow up again, they may have a second shearing, which gives them a better supply of roots, and enables them to stand transplanting better. In June or July transplant to a rich bed in rows three feet apart, plant six or eight inches apart in the rows.

The earth is to be pressed firmly about the roots with the foot.
