

THE CROPS.

How They Look Over the Country. The crops in Utah are all in splendid condition.

MACARTHUR county, Illinois, anticipates a beautiful crop. Some fields in the vicinity of Janesville, Illinois, are headed out.

In the southern part of Indiana the wheat crop is already headed out.

The corn of Georgia promises better than the cotton, although probably both will turn out excellent crops.

The Bedford, Iowa, Southwest says that wheat never looked as well in Taylor county at this season of the year as it does this spring.

In the vicinity of Anna, Illinois, strawberries are looking finely. Apples, peaches, pears, cherries, and grapes never promised better crops than now.

ARMY worms have made their appearance in the fields near Jacksonville, Illinois, and are cutting down the meadows and young corn.

The rain has been very copious throughout Minnesota, and reports come from all sections that crop prospects were better, especially wheat and grass.

Hops in Wisconsin, as stated in previous reports, are generally looking well, and are receiving good attention. Some new yards are being planted in Sauk county.

The Appleton, Wis., Post says winter wheat never looked better at this time of year in Outagamie county than at present. A bountiful harvest is confidently anticipated.

A CORRESPONDENT at Schoolcraft, Michigan, says: There is a good prospect of an abundant crop of all kinds fruit, the trees being now in bloom and covered with blossoms.

The farmers of Marion county, Illinois tell the Salem Advocate that the chinch bugs have attacked the growing wheat in large numbers, and seriously injured many of the fields.

The wheat in Benton county, Illinois, is heading out beautifully, and gives promise of an abundant yield, although the farmers are beginning to complain of the chinch bug.

The Cedar Rapids, Iowa Times says: The prospects for an abundant fruit crop in this vicinity this season is indeed flattering. Both wild and cultivated fruit trees are laden with bloom.

THE Beloit, Wisconsin, Free Press says: From every section we hear that spring grain never looked more promising than it does at present. The recent rains in this vicinity have given vegetation a vigorous start, and with a favorable season for growing crops, we can hardly fail of an abundant harvest.

A GENTLEMAN traveling through Texas writes under date of May 10th, as follows: "For the last few months I traveled over many of the best wheat growing counties in Texas, viz: McLennan, Hill, Ellis, Johnson, Parker, Tarrant, Denton, Dallas, Collin, Grayson, Navarro, Kaufman, and others. I have not seen or heard of a single crop of inferior wheat. The general impression among all the farmers is that they have never seen finer crops. Other small grain crops are equal to the wheat, and corn and cotton look well."

THE fruit crop of this region, says the Cumberland (Md.) News, promises to be as abundant one. All the trees are full with the young fruit, even apricots, which so frequently fail, are sure to yield well this season. An abundance of fruit will aid materially in regulating the prices of grain, and since the late rains the now promising appearance of all grain and grass crops is cheering to those who have to buy any or all of these productions, and famine prices are no longer threatened.

The St. Louis Republican publishes the following prediction: "The years 1846 and '48 were years of great famines in Ireland, and short crops generally in Europe. During those years I dealt largely in wheat and corn. At first I made money; but on the let of June there was a great decline in all foreign markets. It was said to be caused by new vegetables in all the markets. Failures were very numerous in those years among produce dealers. There fore, look out; there will be a great change within thirty days."

MEMORY. A CORRESPONDENT says: "At the present writing we cannot form a trustworthy estimate of the amount of wheat Tennessee may have to export, but, as in several former years, we expect to receive a considerable supply from there. She has not, probably, raised this year more than her own mills will grind during the year, but as they cannot buy it all up and hold it for their wants, and the owners of it will be in haste to get it to market before the price falls much, we expect to note pretty free arrivals of it during the next ninety days, though during the coming winter Tennessee millers may be sending their orders for wheat to this market, as usual."

THE Miner's Journal, Schuylkill county, Pa., says: "The prospect for an abundant crop of almost all kinds of fruit are better now than for a number of years past. Peaches, apricots, plums, pears and apples have passed safely through the winter, escaped the Spring frosts and are generally loaded with fruit. Grapes and raspberries seem to have suffered seriously during the winter. Many old grape vines are entirely killed and many new ones seriously injured. Raspberry canes have suffered serious injury and many of the tenderer varieties where they have not been protected have been entirely killed."

A very interesting case of the successful transfusion of blood from one person to another recently took place in Berlin. The patient was a man 28 years of age, who had been poisoned by phosphorus, having taken a solution of the igneous mass of eight bundles of matches. A transfusion of five hundred cubic centimeters of blood, which had just been taken from three persons in good health, was effected into a vein of the arm, five hundred centimeters of the patient's own blood being at the same time taken from an artery. An improvement in his condition at once set in, and he was able to leave his bed soon afterward.

Lice may be removed from cattle by pouring a small quantity of kerosene on the card with which they are carded.—The application should be frequent, though in but small quantity, till the lice all disappear. The loudest herd I ever saw was completely relieved of them in ten days by this application alone.—Exchange.
