

The traffic and shipment of alligator skins is becoming quite an item in the commercial circles of New Orleans. During the past five months, J. H. Crowell, of that city, has shipped to parties in Boston one thousand four hundred and ninety alligator skins.

The old gentleman is ruminating among the savages, apparently well satisfied with himself and his condition, and taking an occasional trip to find the source of some river. We hope that he will now be left to his reveries and his African friends.

Utah's Wealth. As Mormonism loses its influence in Utah, and the influence of Gentile capital and brains becomes apparent, the resources of the Territory are being rapidly developed, especially in the direction of mining. Hardly a month goes by without some discovery of valuable ore; and the thousands who flock to avail themselves of these discoveries rather extend than exhaust their riches. The latest dispatches tell of wonderful discoveries of silver ore, the assays of which foot up to over \$1,000 per ton. It is said that over \$500,000 worth of ore is in sight, with nobody knows how much more beneath the surface. It is not strange, in view of the great wealth, that the prophet was jealous of the Gentile immigration, and strove to keep the outside world in ignorance of the resources of a Territory which until within a few months he has virtually controlled.

### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF PENNSYLVANIA.

JOINT RESOLUTION, Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania. Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment of the Constitution of this Commonwealth be proposed to the people for their adoption or rejection, pursuant to the provisions of the tenth article thereof, to wit:

AMENDMENT. Strike out the sixth section of the sixth article of the Constitution, and insert in lieu thereof the following: "A State Treasurer shall be chosen by the qualified electors of the State, at such times and for such term of service as shall be prescribed by law."

Approved, the twenty-second day of March, A. D. 1871, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two. JOHN W. GEARY.
