Disinfectant.

Our readers are aware as the hot weather is now with us, the occasional use of disinfectants about houses and premises will be found a wise precaution It is said that one of the cheapest and most effectual of these is copperas mixed in the proportion of a pound of copperas to eight quarts of water, and when thoroughly dissolved, poured down drains or sinks, it will at once remove the most obnoxious smell.

Perspiration Perfume.

The unpleasant odor produced by perspiration is frequently the source of vexation to the persons who are subject to it. Nothing is simpler than to remove this odor much more effectually than by the application of such costly urgents and perfumes are as in use. It is only necessary to procure some compound spirits of ammonia, and place about two table spoonsfull in a basin of water. Washing the face, hands, and arms with this, leave the skin as clean and sweet as one could wish, The wash is perfectly harmless, and very cheap. It is recommended on the authority of an experienced physician.
