## VERMONT HAS SPOKEN!

SHE ROLLS UP 26,000!

"Coming Events Cast Their Shadows-Before.

The State election in Vermont result-The full returns indicate a majority of not less than 26,000, against 21,309 two years ago. The victory is unexpectedly great—the Republicans scarcely looking or old, make more money at work for us in their spare great-the Republicans scarcely looking for more than 20,000, while the Greeleyites would not concede more than 10,000 to 12,000. The Senate is unanimously Republican, while the House will have but a small sprinkling of Democrats.

The returns of the election in Maine, on Monday, indicate a decided victory for the Republicans. A majority of 15, 000 is claimed on the Gubernatorial vote, and all five of the Republican Congress men appear to be elected. It was conceded that the Republicans would succeed in electing their candidates, but it was expected that their success would be achieved on reduced majorities.
