

**Wooden Nails.**  
And yet another use has been found for wood. Wooden pegs, made by the same machine as the pegs, are now largely used for fastening boxes, and manufacturers receive large orders from the West for inch pegs for this purpose. In China, Japan, and Hindostan, pegs of bamboo have always been used in fastening tea chests and wooden packages. The idea of using wooden nails seems to us a good one. The tree nails used in ship building are an example of the value of such wooden nails. The rusting of nails exerts a very destructive action on timber, and this will be avoided by the use of wooden pins. Moreover, it is almost certain that before many years pass away, wood will become so valuable that it will not pay to use the material of packing boxes for firewood, as it is at present done. Now so long as iron nails are used, it becomes a destruction of tools to use old lumber. The use of wooden nails will obviate this difficulty.

**Proclamation by Governor Geary.**

Believing in the Lord, our covenant God in whom our fathers trusted, and in His controlling providence over the affairs of men and nations, a public acknowledgment of His goodness and of our constant dependence upon Him is eminently becoming an enlightened and civilized people. Now, therefore, impressed with these sentiments, in pursuance of a revered custom, and in conformity with the proclamation of Ulysses S. Grant, President of the United States, recommending that Thursday, the 28th day of November next, be set apart as a day of Praise, Prayer and Thanksgiving.

I, John W. Geary, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do most respectfully request the citizens of this State to observe that day as such with all due respect and solemnity. Let thanks be given to Almighty God that he has bestowed upon us all the common blessings of life, giving us health and relieved us from pestilence; that labor is abundantly rewarded; that we have no dread of impending famine, or fear of industrial or commercial distress; that the arts, sciences, general education and the sentiments of peace and good will are steadily advancing. Let us be especially thankful for the great privileges of American citizenship; for the untrammelled expression of opinion; that our political rights still remain safe under beneficent laws and in the hands of an order loving people; and that "equal and exact justice" is vouchsafed to all. For these, and for all other civil, social, and religious blessings we enjoy, let us yield the sincere tribute of grateful hearts, and humbly beseech their continuance. (Given under my hand the great seal of the State at Harrisburg, this twenty eighth day of October, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, and of the Commonwealth the ninety seventh.)


