Iron in the Future.

It is fortunate that we attend to our own interests in our own way, and that we are now in a position to go ahead to any required extent in the iron trade. As we export locomotives to Russia and Germany, so we expect in due time to export into all Europe, just as we now do cotton and provisions. We shall not rest satisfied until we do this; for when that point is reached the great contest will be ended, and American iron will be master of the field as clearly as American cotton now is. It is not the increase of the bread-stuffs exports that we would now turn our attention to, for in that line Russia, Germany, and the Mediterranean countries are our formidable rivals. But we should build iron works all over the Northwest; turn wheat into iron, and instead of shipping pigs of pork ship pigs of iron. See what this industry has already done for the West. The census of 1870 shows the product of manufactures in these states thus; Ohio \$269,713,610; Indiana, \$108,617,278; Illinois, \$205,620,672; Missouri, \$202,212,429; Michigan, \$118,394,976; Wisconsin, \$77,241,326. And all this rests upon the remarkable growth and prosperity of the Western iron manufacture, as is seen in the fact that the largest increase is in the iron districts.—North America.

The Latest Horror:

On Tuesday night of last week, a fire broke out in the Fifth Avenue Hotel, New York, which damaged the building and furniture to the amount of about \$50,000. After the fire had been subdued, sixteen of the servants were found dead in their rooms. Their bodies were all horribly charred and disfigured, and were found in various positions, some of which indicated that they had been overcome by the dense smoke and intense heat while they were endeavoring to escape. Some of the bodies were found lying in the beds, but a majority were lying upon the floors, near the doors and windows, which latter were covered with a strong network of heavy wire, which prevented the escape of those who sought egress in this direction. So strong were these barriers that considerable effort on the part of the firemen was necessary for their removal. A number of others were found alive, but severely burned.

Killing Animals.

Many persons would be glad to know how to kill an animal without suffering and we venture to give the benefit of our experience. We are constantly called upon to destroy horses, dogs and cats, and have little difficulty in doing it. For horses we use a large sponge, say six inches in diameter, thoroughly saturated with chloroform, which is dropped into a bag large enough to be drawn over the horse's nose. It is not desirable to have the bag "air tight;" for, if so, suffocation is likely to ensue. In two or three minutes the horse is unconscious, and in eight to ten minutes dead, without suffering. For dogs and cats a similar process, using a small sponge and bag; or, these animals, with the saturated sponge, may be put in a box admitting some air, when they soon "go to sleep." Seventy-five cents' worth of chloroform will kill a horse, and twenty-five cents' worth a dog or cat. If one saturation of the sponge does not complete the work, repeat it.—Our Dumb Animals.
