

In Maysville, Ky., there is a woman named Jane Young, who, two or three years since, was as black as the daughters of Ethiopia ever are. Now there isn't a lady in all the State possessed of a clearer skin. The change has not been sudden, nor has the woman experienced any sickness. Such instances have occurred before, but they are rare.

Important discoveries of oil have lately been made in Butler county, a locality where its presence has not long been known. Several wells have been opened that yield from 1000 to 1200 barrels each per day. The immediate result has been a great fall in the price of crude oil at the business centres, such as Oil City and Parker's Landing. Oil that was worth \$1.50 per barrel in July is now hard to get rid of at \$1.00, and the production is so large that the tankage is found inadequate. This surplus will probably not last long, for the older oil territory is generally failing. The property of the Cameron Company, which once yielded highly, is now almost useless, and this is the experience of many other places. The price of petroleum is now so low that the export trade from Philadelphia to German ports has become very active.

According to the statements of writers, who have traveled extensively and observed closely, the crops of the northern and western portions of our country will not exceed the average this year. Several of our chief products will not reach the usual standard. Corn was generally planted late and grew poorly. In many places it will be scarcely half a crop, and this is the case in the great corn belt of Illinois, Iowa and Missouri. The recent wet weather has injured the corn very seriously. In wheat the result are much more favorable. It is a fair crop almost everywhere, and very fine in those States where it flourishes best, as Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin and California. Oats has not yielded very well anywhere. Potatoes are a moderate success in the East, but are very good in the West. There have been few complaints of short pasturage in the great grazing regions. Drought has been much more general in the East than in the West this year, and the New England States have suffered especially. Prices of produce continue good, and even if the crops are not all of the best farmers are likely to realize tolerably satisfactory results this year. The trouble with them, as with everybody else in these times, is to keep expenses within the limits of current profits.
