THE PENNSYLVANIA IRON INTEREST.

MANY ESTABLISHMENTS SUSPENDED—A STRIKE IMPENDING—THE UNITED SONS OF VULCAN FIXING THEIR OWN TERMS.

READING, Penn., April 13.—The iron manufacturing interest of Pennsylvania is crippled, and over half the leading establishments are suspended, with an other fourth getting ready to stop work.

We propose to go by market prices. If iron sells at \$70 to 175 per ton, the boiling price shall be \$6 75, helpers to be paid by the heat, 48 cents.

This agreement when signed by the officials of the Union and the Companies is to continue in effect until August, 1875. The iron-masters have determined not to accede to the proposition, and as the Union has a full treasury and the members who have work are bound to contribute to the support of those on a strike, a general conflict will probably grow out of the present complications.
