Decoration Day a Legal Holiday. HARRISBURG, May 25 - [The bill mak ing Decoration day a legal holiday has been signed by the Governo. The fol

lowing is the text of the bill :-Section 1. Be in enacted, That the 30th day of May, commonly call Decora tion day, or when that day falls on the first day of the week the day preceeding it, shall be a legal holiday.

Section 2. It shall be lawful to require 11 months, and 20 days. payment of all notes, checks and bills of exchange due and payable on such holiday to be made on the secular day next months and 6 days. previous thereto, and in default of such payment the same may be protested, and such protest shall be as vilad as if made on the day on which such note, check or bill became due by its own terms.
