Every farmer should have a complete map of his farm, with each field, pasture, and wood lot, together with all the fences, roads and ditches plainly drawn, and either lessly fined \$20 for contempt numbered or named, so they can be readily designated. Few farmers can appreciate the real value of one until they have tried the experiment, for with a map of the farm before you, you can direct your workman to any part of it without the least possibility of making a mistake. You can plan improvements and estimate their cost at your isure, instead of spending half a day of valuable time in surveying the land itself. Any person with a little ingenuity and patience can draw a map of his farm. It should be about two feet square, or larger will soon learn its vale.
