

The Fees of New York Physicians and Dentists.

A writer from New York to a contemporary says:
A physician in good practice will receive patients at his office four hours daily, and make calls for about the same length of time. From ten to twenty callers and half as many house patients would be a fair average; the fees would be \$2 and \$5 each. At these figures it would not be hard to make up an income of \$20,000 or more. It is said of Dr. Willard Parker, I believe that, having been called out of town to attend a patient, he returned a bill of \$300, and when it was disputed he showed by his books that his daily receipts were much over that sum. Surgeons' single charges are much larger than those of physicians, though the incomes of the latter are probably the highest. For ordinary attendance their rates are about the same, or say \$5 a visit. From \$25 upward is the charge for operations. For setting an arm or leg \$250 would be asked, larger undertakings being in proportion. For a case requiring a delicate operation and six weeks' constant attendance, sometimes two or three times a day, \$1,000 was lately asked by a leading surgeon. In another instance, where a wealthy gentleman was badly jammed by a railway car, he was attended by Dr. James R. Wood, who made about a dozen visits, without any important operation, and sent in a bill of \$2,500, which was paid. This is exceeded by Dr. Carnochan, who charged \$2,000 for an operation alone, while another surgeon is said to have received \$4,500 from one patient.
The prices charged by dentists are quite as high as those of physicians. A man of ordinary reputation in the profession will ask from \$5 to \$30 for pulling a single tooth, while Mr. Alkinson, one of the most fashionable dentists, is reported to charge \$10 for simply examining a person's teeth, and \$25 an hour for operating upon them. Many people refuse to pay these fancy prices, but it is a common thing to have to pay from \$10 to \$100 for dentists' bills. Most practitioners of any reputation have engagements far ahead. Ten days is a short time to wait for your turn, while a friend of mine who went to Europe in the middle of last October, on applying to her dentist for treatment, was told that he could not give her an hour's heed until February, or nearly four months in advance. Dentists are kept busy all the year round, and seldom have any leisure. Their practice is confining and not healthy, but it is very profitable. Their incomes range from \$5,000 to \$50,000 a year.

Two Mad Women.

Two women on Essex street are mad at each other. They both live in the same house—one up stairs and the other down stairs. They have been mad at each other two weeks, and the trouble arose about the priority of claim to the rain-water spout on the south corner of the house. From the hour the woman down stairs moved away the tub of the woman up stairs, and put her own in its place, they have not spoken. They both use the same cellar and the same back stoop. Up-Stairs has to pass through the part of Down-Stairs to get down the cellar or out into the yard. They meet in the walk, on the stoop, on the stairs, in the hall, but they do not speak. Up-Stairs watches from the window until Down-Stairs gets out of the yard, and Down-Stairs waits to hear the descending steps of Up-Stairs to get out of the way before the arrival. And yet, in spite of these precautions, twenty times a day they pass each other, and are pressed together in the doorways. But there is not a word, not a look, not a motion of recognition. Down-Stairs curls her upper lip and brings a hard expression into her eyes and face on the appearance of Up-Stairs. On recognizing this Up-Stairs assumes an expression of supreme indifference. And both experience intense satisfaction in so doing. They are mad at each other, are those two women. Not mad because of the rain water and the antagonistic tubs; it has gone way beyond that now, but Up-Stairs is mad at Down-Stairs, Down-Stairs is mad at Up-Stairs. And yet with these rancorous feelings in each breast, and constant self-inflicted irritation in consequence thereof, it is a happy house. Never before were there such clear singing, such hearty laughter, such merry voices in talk as are daily heard in that house of distrust and bitterness. Up-Stairs trills her happiest melodies in a key so high that it cannot fail to pierce the floor and ceiling between her and her neighbor, and gloats over the disaster working in the heart of Down-Stairs as the strains reach her. No sooner does she cease than Down-Stairs pours out her soul in happy song, increasing its power as she by intuition realizes the jar it is bringing to the feelings of the hateful Up-Stairs while Up-Stairs grates her teeth in the seclusion of her own apartment and uncomfortably listens to what she would gladly shut out. And how those two women laugh! Their risibilities appear to be on the most delicate springs which the slightest touch throws into motion. And such merry laughs! so free from trace of care, so hearty, so ringing, so happy in their rippling. And the vivacity their talk to casual neighborly visitors is beyond our description. Up-Stairs knows when Down-Stairs has company by the merry tone of the entertainer, and strains her ear in vain to catch the voice of the new-comer. To see her now—with fingers nervously pressing the palms—with color going and coming at the beck of that loud, care-free voice below—with mouth compressed in the sorest kind of pain, one must rub his eyes right hard to recognize her an hour later in the fluttering ribbons, bright colors, proud step, and self-satisfied air of the lady on whom Down-Stairs is evil glaring through the apertures of her front blinds, as she steps down the walk and smilingly nods to the right and to the left.—Danbury News.

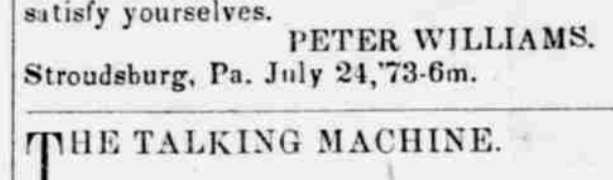
