

The total receipts of grain by lake, at Buffalo, for the month of October, foot up 1,851,063 bushels, against 12,870,131 in the same month last year. The receipts of grain, however, show an increase of about twenty thousand barrels over the receipts of the corresponding month last year. The total receipts by lake from the beginning of the season up to last Saturday, amount to 49,488,808 bushels, showing a falling off as compared with the receipts last year, of eight million bushels. Altogether it has been an unusually dull and unprofitable season for the grain trade.

**Comets.**  
Mr. Reeves, the well known astronomer is reported to have advanced, in one of the English scientific associations, an entirely new theory with regard to comets, and, by the use of diagrams he demonstrated that the part of the comet termed the tail being always in the direction from the sun, and therefore as often in advance of the nucleus, is not really a tail. He argues that as comets are transitory, and all matter is known to be either solid, or gaseous, comets must be the latter, and he says, by which this gaseous matter can be held together is gravity, which is not necessarily a center, and every part of the body being free to move, revolves itself into a sphere, the center of which is in many cases exceedingly dense, gradually attenuating toward the circumference. This being the case, the bright part of the sun are refracted in their passage through the spherical comet, thus illuminating the portion beyond the centre of the nucleus, which illumination forms the tail, all this being, according to Prof. Reeves' theory, entirely in accordance with nature's universal laws.

### EDUCATIONS OF MURDERERS IN PENNSYLVANIA.

**UNDERZOOK HANGED AT WEST CHESTER**  
—THE DOOMED MAN MAKES NO CONFESSION.  
West Chester, Penn., Nov. 12.—At 10 p. m. Underzook was brought from jail and passed through the jail yard accompanied by the Sheriff, his deputy, and the prison's spiritual advisers. He walked with no outward exhibition of terror the dreadful fate that awaited him. He ascended the steps of the scaffold, when a prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. G. A few moments were then spent in a colloquy between the prisoner and his spiritual advisers. His last words to the ministers who have been in constant attendance on him were: "All I have to say is, I am a sinner saved by grace and I accept of God." The Sheriff then descended him and shook hands with him, placing the black cap upon the prisoner, and Sheriff Gill pulled the drop at 12:19, which ensued by strangulation, Underzook being no outward exhibition that he was dying. At 12:30 the heart had ceased to beat and the physicians pronounced him dead. His body will be placed at the disposal of his friends. He made no confession.

### EDUCATION OF O'MARA AND IRVING AT MONTROSE—NO ATTEMPT MADE TO RESCUE THE PRISONERS AS THREATENED.

Montrose, N. Y., Nov. 12.—O'Mara and Irving were hanged at Montrose, Penn., today for the murder of the mother and son of the former. The execution took place between the hours of 10:30 and 10:45. At 10:25 O'Mara entered the jail supported by two Catholic priests. He followed 20 feet behind, also supported by two priests. O'Mara carried a book, kissing it as he walked alone. At 10:30 the signal was given, the weights dropped, and both victims were jerked up about seven feet, and then fell to within 24 feet of the ground. They died very quickly, both being pronounced dead in ten minutes. Fears of an attempt to rescue the prisoners had been entertained, and a band of soldiers was sent from Scranton to preserve order. No disturbance, however, was attempted, and everything passed quietly. Irving was a member of the notorious "Molly Maguire's Gang," which was threatened to rescue him. O'Mara made a confession of the murder. Irving had having actually participated in it, he acknowledged being present. Their bodies will be taken possession of by friends.

### Thanksgiving Day—President's Proclamation.

The following proclamation was promulgated on the 29th ult:—  
By the President of the United States of America:  
A PROCLAMATION.  
We are reminded by the changing seasons that it is time to pause in our daily avocations and offer thanks to Almighty God for the mercies and abundance of the year that is drawing to a close. The blessings of a free government continue to be manifested to us, the earth has responded to the labor of the husbandman, the land has been free from pestilence, internal peace is being maintained, and peace with our powers has prevailed.  
It is fitting that at stated periods we should cease from our accustomed pursuits, and pause from the turmoil of our daily lives, and in thankfulness for the blessings of the past, and in the continuation of kindly regards toward each other. Now, therefore, recognizing these considerations, I, Grover C. Cleveland, President of the United States, do recommend to all citizens to assemble in their respective places of worship on **THURSDAY, THE TWENTY-SIXTH DAY OF NOVEMBER, 1874**, and express their thanks for the mercy and favor of Almighty God, and laying aside all political animosities and all secular occupations, to observe such day as a day of rest, thanksgiving and praise.  
In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.  
At the city of Washington this twenty-sixth day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and of the Independence of the United States the ninety-ninth.

The above does not include payments made on account of interest on the principal of public debt of the United States.

In the first six months of 1874, 1109 wild beasts were killed in the central provinces of India, for which 10,325 rupees (\$5,162.25) were paid as rewards. The total number includes 185 tigers and cubs, among which there was only one "man eater;" 366 panthers, leopards and cubs, 227,227 bears and cubs, 84 wolves and cubs, and 247 hyenas and cubs.
