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From all these we have everything to encourage the carrying out of this plan. FRIDAY, DEC. 4th, 1874. Institute met per adjournment.

Mr. Morey opened the discussion on Transitive verbs. All verbs are either transitive or intransitive. Explanation of what a transitive verb is. A transitive verb is transitive whether there is any object or not, and they should be parsed as such.

Prof. Raub continued the discussion of grammar from where Mr. Morey left it. He then spoke of prepositional antecedents. A preposition always shows the relation between its object and the word modified by the preposition and its object.

In parsing the relative pronoun "what," Prof. differs from most grammarians. The relative "what" has a double construction and is sometimes the object of two different verbs, and is sometimes the object of one verb and the subject of another.

In parsing the word "mine," we should say it has the possessive form and may be either subject or object.

The next thing in order was some general questions by teachers. The committee on resolutions then made their report which was accepted.

Resolved, That District and County Institutes are the best means of advancing the cause of education.

Resolved, That we would urge upon the teachers in the county, the importance and necessity of establishing District Teachers' Institutes.

Resolved, That this year's Institute, with all its faults and defects, was a decided success, and of advantage to all the teachers that attended it.

Resolved, That inasmuch as we hold a Teachers' Institute annually, and inasmuch as we have no better place to meet in than the Court House, which has become too small for this as well as for other purposes, it is our opinion, either that the county authorities should erect a Court House containing a room sufficiently large to accommodate from five hundred to six hundred people or that the citizens of Stroudsburg should erect a public hall sufficient for all public purposes in a town of its size.

Resolved, That as members of the County Institute, we heartily endorse the action of the citizens of Stroudsburg, East Stroudsburg and vicinity in their efforts to have a State Normal School established in this county; and we earnestly hope that immediate steps will be taken to secure sufficient funds and erect the necessary buildings, so that the Institution may be recognized by the state authorities, and the school be opened at the earliest possible day.

Resolved, That we regret that not more of the clergymen and other professional men in the town and county, were present at this session of the Institute.

Resolved, That we tender our thanks to the officers of the Institute, for the manner in which they discharged their respective duties.

Resolved, That we tender our thanks to the citizens of Stroudsburg for the tokens of kindness with which they were pleased to favor us.

Resolved, That we tender our thanks to these ladies and gentlemen who took the lead in favoring the Institute with vocal and instrumental music.

Common Sense. It has been said in another form of expression that the slightest excess of expenses over income is poverty, and the slightest excess of income over expenses is wealth. The ability of practical farmers to master this great problem of life is not so much dependent upon what they know of their business as on their faculty to apply what they know. Success in business is due to administration. Capacity in administration is due to that faculty, power, or quality called common sense, which everybody speaks well of and nobody understands exactly. We infer its presence or its absence from the results of a man's life. We venture upon a definition of the phrase we are using not so much for the purpose of making its meaning clear as for the greater purpose of giving it a loftier place in your thoughts. Common sense is a degree, a high degree—in fine, the highest degree of human wisdom applied to practical things. It is not learning; it is not knowledge; it is rather the faculty of applying what we may know to what we do. Other things being equal, the practical farmer who knows the most will do the best; but other things not being equal, a man who excels in wisdom in administration may surpass a man of greater learning, or even greater knowledge of things. But do not allow this suggestion to lead you to place a low estimate upon learning, whether general or professional; culture of every sort gives us capacity to appreciate wisdom, and opportunity also for its exercise.

Beware of the Sink. A distinguished medical authority warns the drinkers of water of wells near dwellings, to beware of the typhoid poison sure to be found sooner or later in these reservoirs, if any of the house drainage can percolate to them. The gelatinous matter often found upon the stones of a well is poison to the human system, causing by its spores a fermentation of the blood, with the abnormal heat of fever. Wholesome, untainted water is always free from color and odor. To test it—thoroughly, place in it a few grains of lump sugar, and expel it, stoppered to sunlight, in a window. If, even after an exposure of eight or ten days the water becomes turbid, be sure that it has been contaminated by sewerage of some kind. If it remains perfectly clear, it is pure and safe.
