Here is a hint for housekeepers, and a very important one. Merely covering up a bed with blankets and counterpanes will no more protect it from dampness or keep dry than a pane of glass will keep out light. The atmospheric moisture will penetrate all these fabrics. Hence, the importance of keeping the beds in spare rooms regularly aired. Many a dear friend or welcome visitor has been sent to an untimely grave or afflicted with the life with disease, by being put into a bed which had been permitted to stand unoccupied. Keep the spare beds, when not used, free from all covering but a light sheet.

The following simple method for ventilating ordinary sleeping and dwelling rooms is recommended by Mr. Hinton in his "Physiology for Practical Use." A piece of wood, three inches high and exactly as long as the width of the window, is to be prepared. The sash be now raised, the slip of wood placed on the sill, and the sash drawn closed upon it. If the slip has been well chosen, there will be no draught in consequence of this displacement of the sash at the lower part; but the top of the lower pane will overlap the bottom of the upper pane, and between the two bars perpendicular currents of air, not felt as draught, will enter and leave the room.

And yet, strange to say, that child was not spanked and put to bed.

Arrest of Bank Robbers.

New York, Feb. 5. - A Scranton special to the Sun says detectives have arrested in that city eight persons, implicated, as alleged, in the robbery of the National Bank of Carbondale.

The arrested persons are G. Bond and John A. Decker, and son; John McGovern, Billy Brown and Billy Rafferty. Five thousand dollars of the stolen money were found on the premises of one of the parties. More arrests are expected to-night.

The Bankruptcy Laws.

John B. Storm, at present representing the 11th Congressional District of this State in Congress has introduced a very important bill into the House of Representatives, amendatory of the act of June 22, 1874, relating to bankruptcy. The bill which has passed the House and awaits the action of the Senate, provides that "no member of section nine of the act of June 22, 1874, as relates to cases of discharge in involuntary or compulsory bankruptcy shall be deemed and taken to apply to all proceedings in involuntary or compulsory bankruptcy, whether the same were commenced before or after the passage of said act."

Report of the Commission on the Amendment of the State Constitution.

The report submitted to the Senate by the commissioners appointed to suggest amendments to the Constitution is a very remarkable document as regards length. The full report would fill at least nine of these columns.

The most important changes recommended are those bearing upon the judicial system. The abolition of cumulative voting in the election of Supreme Court judges is urged, by striking out entire Section 16 Article V. The commission declare their purpose to be a return to a direct election by the people of all Supreme Court judges, and characterize the present system as "an anomalous, irregular, and anti-democratic expedient, to reach a purpose foreign to the true principles of right government." The commissioners also propose to redivide the State for judicial purposes on the basis of population, instead of on the basis of population solely, as at present. They argue that there is no necessity for amending every county having a population of 40,000 to be made a separate district. They present an elaborate table of the business of the courts by counties and districts during 1872 and 1873, and state that "an inspection of the table will show that the duties of the president judge in some of the judicial districts is almost a sinecure, while in some of the mining, manufacturing, and other business counties the courts are constantly employed." It is proposed to authorize the Legislature, at its discretion, to make single counties separate judicial districts, when demanded by the amount of business, and when the population is 50,000.

The table showing the business transacted by the courts in 1872 and 1873 presents some curious results. Thus, among the poorest single county districts, the court is very busy in Delaware county only five weeks in the year, and in Beaver, Indiana, and Mercer only six weeks; while in Berks and Lancaster 24 weeks are required to transact the business; in Schuylkill over 20 weeks are required for the civil court, and 22 weeks of the criminal court; and in several other counties, about 20 weeks.

Some of the districts made up of more than one county the business is, even now, very light, 54 weeks suffering for the 41st week in the year, composed of Juniata and Perry, while in only half of these sixteen districts the average sessions of the courts last year was upwards.

The report goes to the Committee on Constitutional Reform, for its action.

Tax on Weiss Beer.

Weiss beer, of certain strength, has by former rulings of the internal revenue department, been considered as coming within the exemption from taxation of "root beer and other small beer." The revised statutes of the United States, however, provide that a tax of one dollar per barrel shall be paid on all beer, &c., and other fermented liquors, and as the exemption act referred to was not re-enacted, but became void, and weiss beer being fermented liquor, produced from malt, or a substitute thereof, and hops, it must be considered as coming within the description of fermented liquors, liable to taxation. Therefore, all weiss beer made and sold, or removed for consumption or sale, without payment of tax by affixing stamps, on and after January 1st, 1875, will be reported for assessment by collectors, and brewers will be required to return such weiss beer as is made by them after the date aforesaid.

A Magnificent Gift to Gen. Sherman's Daughter.

The wedding present from the Khedive of Europe to the daughter of Gen. Sherman recently arrived in New York, and is thus described by the reporters: The present is a parure of diamonds, necklace and ear drops, said to be the most magnificent and valuable in this country. The necklace is composed of four strands of diamonds, each of which is a brilliant. Not one of them is worth less than \$1,000. The chain is studded with the gems, and they are set so closely together as to hide the gold. There are so many of them that Deputy Collector Lydecker tired in the count. The strands are joined by ten immense stones, each of which is encircled by smaller gems. The one in front is the size of a hickory nut and is worth \$20,000. Pendant from the front is a festoon of brilliants with five big pearshaped stones of the finest water lustrous hanging from it. The ornaments for the ear are single stones equally as large as the rest. The entire set is appraised at from \$250,000 to \$300,000. The case for the jewels is plain morocco, without an inscription. As soon as the Secretary of the Treasury orders a free permit for them under the special act of Congress they are to be delivered to the Turkish Minister, and by him presented to the fair bride on behalf of the Egyptian potentate.
