Be it enacted and Ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of East Stroudsburg: That all the property owners on the West side of Courtland Street, from the corner of Brown and Courtland street to a Wild Cherry Tree at the corner of W. E. Henry's Lot, in said street, shall curb and pave the sidewalk along their respective properties, either with Brick or Stone, by August 1st, 1875. The width of said sidewalk to be six feet.
