

A New Remedy for Potato Bugs. An agent residing in Harrisburg having a few potato hills or stalks is his yard, observed on one hill seven potato bugs, which he removed and destroyed. Next day eighteen more bugs were picked off and exterminated. A lot of fresh horse manure was then placed around on the stalks and singular enough the bugs gave the vines or hills a wide berth after the manure had been applied. Farmers and others raising this indispensable esculent will do well to try the experiment.

An Afflicted Country. Turkey is a most unfortunate country just now. Besides the ravages of famine a deadly disease is raging among the flocks and herds throughout the empire from Bagdad to the Adriatic. In the province of Smyrna a kind of small pox has broken out among the sheep, while there is a pulmonary disease among the cattle that is rapidly thinning the herds. On the plains of Troy, the skeletons of thousands and thousands of sheep cover the ground. Shepherds, stripped of their entire herds in many cases, have gone insane over the calamity. In the country about Adrianople fully thirty per cent. of the horned cattle and horses have already died of disease. The entire pastoral regions of the empire seem smitten with the disorder, which is said to greatly resemble the murrain spoken of in the Bible.

Board of Pardons. HARRISBURG, June 10.—The Board of Pardons, which met in the office of the Secretary of State, yesterday morning, at ten o'clock, did not conclude its labors until midnight. Attorney-General Dimmick, General McCandless, Secretary of Internal Affairs, and Colonel Quay, Secretary of State, were present. About fifty applications were considered, half of them new cases. Of this number four were recommended for pardon, as follows:—Marcus Vogt, of Harrisburg, felonious assault; Charles Africa, of Huntingdon, assault and battery; Richard Ennis, of Allegheny, larceny; Michael Sullivan, of Philadelphia, assault and battery. The remainder of the applications with the exception of six or seven held under advisement, were refused. The commutation of the death sentence of Andrew Lynch, of Allegheny, and Henry Briedland, of Washington, to imprisonment for life in the penitentiary, was formally entered on the minutes.

Sec. 2.—That said Stroudsburg Passenger Railway Company be and hereby is directed in re-laying said Railway track to conform with the grade of said Washington street as the same has been established by the Burgess and Town Council of said Borough of East Stroudsburg. Sec. 3.—That ten days notice shall be given to said Stroudsburg Passenger Railway Company of the enactment of this ordinance, and that said Railway be removed as herein enacted within two months from the service of said notice.
